

# WHICH BIBLE SHOULD I USE?

## Your Guide to Catholic Study Bibles and Translations

### START HERE

Wondering which Bible to buy to start your studies? The quickest answer is—*the one you'll read!* Ideally, you will want a Catholic Study Bible, published after 2010. Read on to learn more about different translations and supplemental content.

### TRANSLATIONS

No two English translations of the Bible are the same, because translators have to make a myriad of decisions about word choice, sentence structure, etc. The best translation for you will be the one you enjoy reading! The most common translations used in our classes are:

**RSV (Revised Standard Version), RSVCE, and RSV2CE:** The RSV family is the most common translation used by Catholic Scripture scholars in the United States. The RSV and RSV-CE (RSV-Catholic Edition) with 1966 copyright dates use older language (e.g. thee, thou, didst, etc.). The 2006 RSV Ignatius Edition and 2006 RSV-2CE have more contemporary language and sentence structure, and are found in Bibles published in the past fifteen years.

**NABRE (New American Bible, Revised Edition):** This translation is closest to what is proclaimed at Mass. This Revised Edition of the NAB greatly improved the Old Testament translation. The downside is that in several books the NAB-RE uses different verse numbers than are found in the RSV and most scholarly works on Scripture. If you choose this translation, be sure you have the NAB-RE (copyright 2010 or newer), not the NAB.

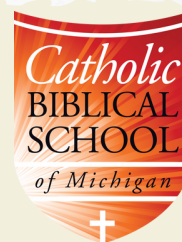

**NRSV Catholic Edition (New Revised Standard Version - Catholic Edition):** Similar to the RSV, this translation uses simplified language and sentence structure so that it is easier to understand. It is not as literal of a translation as the RSV or NABRE, but is more readily available in Large Print format and useful for people for whom English is a second language.

## ADDITIONAL CONTENT

Different publishers include different content in their Bibles. We encourage people to buy a study Bible, that is, a Bible which includes introductions to the books, footnotes, maps, etc. These will help support your learning. The most popular Catholic study Bibles used in our classes are:

**The Didache Bible RSV2CE.** This Study Bible is a favorite of catechists for the in-depth references to the Catechism and articles on the Catholic faith. What it lacks are good notes on history, cultural background, and the biblical text. Thus, some participants have found it to be a useful resource for understanding the faith, but not as beneficial for understanding Scripture.

**The Didache Bible, NABRE.** The same as above, and with additional NABRE translation footnotes.

**Little Rock Catholic Study Bible, Revised 2011, NABRE.** Little Rock Scripture Study has pulled together their best study materials for this visually engaging Bible that includes sidebars, maps, and charts integrated into the text. Our participants enjoy its layout and find the materials easy to understand.

**Ignatius Catholic Study Bible Old & New Testaments, RSV2CE.** This 3" thick Study Bible has extensive footnotes exploring the language and culture of the text, as well as spiritual applications and catechetical connections. This is a favorite for our participants who enjoy having as many notes on a page as there is biblical text!

**The Catholic Study Bible, 3rd Ed., NABRE.** This is the most recent edition (©2016, red cover) of the academic-oriented Catholic Study Bible by Oxford University Press. This Bible is known for its historically-grounded study materials, many of which have been updated for the Old Testament portions of this edition.

## LARGE PRINT

**NRSV XL Catholic Edition.** This 12 pt font large print Bible balances readability with size. It has some additional resources, but it does not provide footnotes.

**Ignatius Large Print Bible, RSV-2CE.** This large print bible provides 14 pt font and includes maps. It does not have extensive footnotes nor other study materials.

**New Catholic Bible Giant Print.** This new translation is the only large print Bible (14pt font) that includes extensive study materials. Each book has an introduction and study notes at the end to help explain specific verses. Devotional and practical articles are also included.

**The Great Adventure 2<sup>nd</sup> Ed, Large Print.** This version of the Great Adventure Bible uses 11.25 font and extensive references to the CCC. It lacks extensive footnotes and other study materials.
